RELIGIOUS VISITS



SAFEGUARDING - UNDERSTANDING THE 'MANOSPHERE'

Following Netflix's powerful miniseries Adolescence, many parents are becoming increasingly concerned about the growing influence of the 'manosphere'—a network of online spaces promoting harmful ideas about gender and masculinity that boys find it easy to stumble into. Adolescence explores how easily boys can be drawn into these toxic communities, often without parents realising. It is a must watch. These spaces can distort boys' understanding of relationships, emotions, and respect, leading to worrying changes in behaviour.

As parents, there are some key signs to look out for: sudden hostility towards females (classmates, relatives, teachers etc.), using phrases like "alpha male" or "beta", a fixation on dominance or status, or an increase in secretive online activity. It's also worth watching for a shift in tone—mocking empathy or becoming overly critical of others.

Current thinking suggests that the best defence is open, non-judgmental conversation. Ask questions about who your child follows online, talk about respect and equality, and encourage critical thinking about online content. Boys need strong role models, both male and female, who value kindness, empathy, and emotional intelligence.

HOUSES

This is a reminder that our school is split into 4 houses, red, blue, yellow or green. In the past, these were named after castles / abbeys, but we thought it was time for a change. REMINDER



Please can parents / carers remember to park considerately when dropping children off and picking them up. It is important that enough space is left for emergency service vehicles to be able to pass by cars if necessary. Please do not drive into school unless there is an emergency, this includes parking in the small car park at the bottom of the drive and the main car park at the top of the drive. Please also do not park on any grass around the school. Please remember that there are children present at the start and end of the school day.

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
