SAFEGUARDING – PARENTAL MENTAL HEALTH

A January report from the Association of Directors of Children's Services (ADCS) revealed that poor parental mental health has overtaken domestic violence as the leading cause of child protection referrals in England. This reflects the growing pressures many families are facing – from rising living costs to the long-term impact of the pandemic – and how these can affect both adults and children at home. At school, we sometimes see how changes in a child's behaviour or emotional wellbeing can be linked to challenges happening behind the scenes. It is important to remember that asking for help is a strength, not a weakness. If you or someone you know is struggling, there is support available locally through services like North Yorkshire's Early Help, your GP, or charities such as Mind and the Samaritans. We are also here to listen and help where we can. By working together and talking openly, we can make sure every child continues to feel safe, supported and ready to learn.
