Greater Depth Write a sentence including a list of 5 groups of words using 'and' or 'or' before the final item.

Questions 2, 6 and 9 (Reasoning)
Developing Explain where a missing comma should go in the sentence. Lists include 3 items using 'and' before the final item.
Expected Explain where the missing commas should go in the sentence. Lists contain up to 4 items sing 'and' or 'or' before the final item.
Greater Depth Explain where the missing commas should go in the sentence. Lists contain 4 groups of words using 'and' or 'or' before the final item.

## Developing

## Expected

6a. The commas should go after 'cars' and 'vans' to separate the items in the list. Commas are not needed after 'trucks' or 'motorbikes' because these are the last items in the list so they are separated by 'and'.

## Greater Depth

7a. She has ordered roast chicken, boiled potatoes, green vegetables and steamed carrots for dinner.
8a. Various answers, for example: Laura needs to pack her red spade, blue bucket, swimming costume, stripy beach towel and comfy sandals for the beach. 9a. The commas should go after 'jumper' and 'hoodie' to separate the items in the list. Commas are not needed after 'jacket' or 'coat' because these are the last items in the list so they are separated by 'or'.

## Developing

1b. She has been to England, Wales and Scotland.
2b. Various answers, for example: There are lions, bears and zebras in the zoo.
3b. The comma should go after 'hot' to separate the items in the list. A comma is not needed after 'bright' or 'sunny' because they are the last items in the list so they are separated by 'and'.

## Expected

4b. Jessica has got chicken, tomato, basil and cheese in her pasta.
5b. Various answers, for example: You can find fish, sharks, dolphins and whales in the sea.
6b. The commas should go after 'sweets' and 'biscuits' to separate the items in the list. Commas are not needed after 'chocolate' or 'crisps' because these are the last items in the list so they are separated by 'or'.

## Greater Depth

7b. Samuel will play football, walk in the woods, play in the park or paddle in the pool this morning.
8b. Various answers, for example: Kelly needs to buy a bag of flour, some brown sugar, a jar of jam, a bottle of milk and a carton of eggs from the shop.
9b. The commas should go after 'sandwiches' and 'crisps' to separate the items in the list. Commas are not needed after 'fingers' and 'sweets' because these are the last items in the list so they are separated by 'and'.
