





Information about Hedgehogs



Hedgehogs have about 5000 spines on their coat. They have and coarse hair on their face and tummy. When hedgehogs are scared they curl into a ball. Their prickly coat protects them from predators like badgers.

Hedgehogs **eat** lots of things including slugs, snails, caterpillars, beetles, earthworms, bird eggs and soft fruit.



Hedgehogs are **nocturnal**. They sleep all day and are awake all night. They sleep in a nest under bushes or shrubs.

Hedgehogs **hibernate** when there is not enough food. In the UK they hibernate during the winter. They curl into a tight ball and **sleep** for about four months.





Hedgehogs are **born** blind with soft prickles. They stay with their mum for five to six weeks, then they live on their own.

A summer's day in the life of a dormouse.

I eat until the sun begins to rise then I scamper home to sleep in my nest.

(Curl back into ball)

I sleep in my nest for around six months.

(Curl into ball)

From the first signs of frost until the weather warms I stay hidden in my nest.

(Still curled sleeping)
