



## I can use regular and irregular plurals.

Most nouns form their plural by adding either **s** (books, castles, dragons) or **es** (boxes, crosses, witches). These are called **regular plurals**.

But not all nouns follow the same pattern. In fact, some of our most common nouns have an *irregular plural* form (child / child**ren**, woman / wom**en**).


Here is a list of nouns:
