

The Witches by Roald Dahl ROALD WICHES	BEWARE. Real witches dress in ordinary clothes and look like ordinary women. But they are not ordinary. They are always plotting and scheming with murderous, bloodthirsty thoughts – and they hate children. The Grand High Witch hates children most of all and plans to make every single one of you disappear. Only one boy and his grandmother can stop her, but if their plan fails, the Grand High Witch will frizzle them like fritters and then what?	This has got to be my all-time favourite read. I absolutely love everything about it, from the characters to the storyline. There are some fabulous descriptions of the witches and you really feel as though you become part of the story. As a little girl, I would often wonder if there was some truth in this book and I really did used to look out for square shoes and funny coloured eyes when passing strangers in the street. I love reading this book aloud in school too, even though my Grand High Witch voice does give me a sore throat after a while!
The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch by Ronda and David Armitage Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch	Every day, Mr Grinling, the lighthouse keeper cleans and polishes his light to make sure it shines brightly at night. At lunchtime he tucks into a delicious and well-deserved lunch, prepared by his wife. But Mr Grinling isn't the only one who enjoys the tasty food. Will Mrs Grinling think of a way to stop the greedy seagulls from stealing the lighthouse keeper's lunch?	This is the first story I was read by my Reception teacher, Mrs Harrison, when I was at school a long time ago! Being only 5 years old, I became obsessed with this story and would choose to read it at any opportunity. I think Mrs Grinling really does come up with the most ingenious plans to scare away those pesky seagulls - find out if her hard thinking pays off in the end.
Burglar Bill by Janet and Allan Ahlberg ^a Burglar Bill Janet & Allan Ahlberg	Who's that creeping down the street? Who's that climbing up the wall? Who's that coming through the window? Who's that? It's Burglar Bill.	This is a Ruddy favourite in our house, even Daniel and Reuben know all of the words and can read it off-by-heart. This is one of my favourite books to read out loud because the authors have brought the characters to life by writing their speaking parts as they would have said them. Burglar Bill lands himself with an unexpected stolen item and a rather noisy and smelly one at that!
Charlotte's Web by E. B White Charlotte's Web EBWille Gorff William	One spring morning a little girl called Fern rescues a runt and names him Wilbur. But then Wilbur is sent to live on a farm where he meets Charlotte, a beautiful large grey spider. They become best friends and, when Wilbur is faced with the usual fate of nice fat little pigs, Charlotte must find a clever way to save him.	Charlotte's Web is a story that I always enjoyed reading as a child and it's one I still like to share with children in school. There are some very funny farmyard characters to meet along the way, my favourites being, Templeton the selfish rat and the stuttering goose. Although this is a very lovely story, be prepared for a sad twist and have a tissue at the ready.


The Whitby Witches by Robin Jarvis



When orphans Ben and Jennet arrive in the seaside town of Whitby to stay with Alice Boston, they have no idea what to expect. A lively 92-year-old, Miss Boston is unlike any other foster mother they've known. Ben is gifted with "the sight," which gives him the power to see things invisible to other mortals. He soon encounters the mysterious fisher folk who live under the cliffs and discovers that Alice and her friends are not quite what they seem. But a darkness is stalking the streets of Whitby, bringing with it fear and death. Could it be a ghost from the Abbey? Or a beast from hell? Unless the truth is uncovered, the town and all its inhabitants is doomed.

If you like books that are full of fantasy, mystery and are overall a bit spooky then this will definitely be the book for you. I first read this book when I was about 10, and living not too far from Whitby, it had me gripped from the very beginning. I especially enjoy this book because it is centred around some of Whitby's famous landmarks, making it exciting to think that the various events could have actually taken place. The Story of the Little Mole who knew it was none of his business by Werner Holzwarth




A terrible catastrophe befalls the little mole one bright, sunny morning. It looks like a sausage, and the worst thing is it lands right on his head.
